Agenda Summary

The following items were approved by the Mayor and City Council in June 2018.

Proclamations and Resolutions:

- **Resolution No. 06-06-18** - Approving a project and Grant Agreement for the construction of a 3,200 square foot picnic pavilion at the John Porter Park.
- **Proclamation No. 06-07-18** - Establishing a Grant Program and approved grant guidelines for the Sanger Texas Development Corporation.
- **Resolution No. 06-08-18** - Appointing members to the Fire Code Board of Appeals.
- **Resolution No. 06-09-18** – Suspending the effective date for ninety days in connection with the rate of increase filing made on about on June 1, 2018 by Atmos Energy for its Mid-Tex Division.

Ordinances Passed

- **Ordinance #06-16-18** – Amended Chapter 15 Parks and Recreation, Article 15.500 “Parkland Dedication”.
- **Ordinance #05-10-18** – Amended the Comprehensive Zoning Ordinance and Official Zoning Map by amending the Planned Development District created by Ordinance #06-18-17 (PD-SF-06) to extend the boundaries to include an approximately 3.634-acre tract and rezone said tract from “A” Agricultural District to Planned Development District PD-SF-06 and amending section 3 “Area Regulations.” The property is generally located west of Rector Road and Railroad Line and north of Eider Drive and First Street.
- **Ordinance #05-11-18** – Amended the Comprehensive Land Use Plan and Future Land Use Map by changing the use classification from Rural Residential use and Commercial to Industrial on a certain approximately 55.147 acres situated in the William Mason Survey Abstract No. 801, and generally located west of I-35 north and approximately 650 feet south of View Road.
- **Ordinance #05-12-18** – Amended the Comprehensive Zoning Ordinance and the Official Zoning Map by changing the zoning classification from “A” Agricultural District to I-1 Industrial District on approximately 55.147 acres situated in the William Mason Survey Abstract No. 801, and generally located west of I-35 and 650 feet South of View Road.
- **Ordinance #05-13-18** – Amending the Comprehensive Zoning Ordinance and Zoning Map to grant a Specific Use Permit to allow a temporary concrete batch plant as a use at the R & L Carriers job site, generally located east of I-35 and north of View Road.

Plats Approved:

- **Replat of the Willowood Addition** – 34.58 Acres generally located east west of Rector Road and Railroad Line and north of Eider Drive and First Street.

- **Amended Plat** of Lot 5R1-R and 5R2-R Block A, N.L. Hobbs Addition being 5.89 Acres situated in the Reuben BeBee Survey Abstract No. 29 and Generally located northeast of the intersection of Marion Road and Sanger Circle Drive.
- **Preliminary Plat of Arrowhead Estates**, being approximately 3 acres of land subdivided into 14 single family residential lots in the H. Tierwester Survey, Abstract No. 1241, generally located at the southeast corner of Willow Street and Railroad Avenue.

Monthly Report – June 2018

Police

During the month of June 2018 Officers of the Sanger Police Department responded to a total of 485 calls for service having an average response time of 3 minutes per call. The department issued a total of 47 citations and 35 warnings.

The Texas Department of Public Safety Uniform Crime Reporting tracks seven classifications of offenses. You will find below a list of those classifications as well as any of those classifications the Department responded to:

- Criminal Homicide
- Forcible Rape
- Robbery
- Assault -4
- Burglary-1
- Larceny/Theft-4
- Motor Vehicle Theft-1

The 4th of July fireworks always brings our community with one ongoing issue. The problem is the increased call load caused by fireworks complaints. This starts the first day fireworks become legal to sell. City Ordinance prohibits the discharge of fireworks within the city limits of Sanger. It does not prohibit the possession of fireworks. At no time within the last 36 years has it ever been legal to discharge fireworks of any kind. This year we had an increased challenge due to social networking letting everyone know the location of officers while they were on patrol. Discharging fireworks citations will be issued to anyone violating this ordinance.

Courts

- For the month of June, 2018, the Municipal Court filed 51 citations.
- There were 3 requests for deferred disposition and 1 request for driver safety course.
- There were 5 cases successfully closed by deferred disposition and 2 cases successfully closed by driver safety course.
- The court closed 22 cases by payment in full or time served.
- The total fines, court costs and other fees collected were \$5,282.20 with \$2,067.44 of that being remitted to the State.

DID YOU KNOW...

Municipal courts in Texas come into contact with more defendants than all other Texas courts combined. The subject matter of municipal courts relates to crimes relating to public safety and quality of life issues. In recent years, municipal courts and justice court in Texas have become the primary venue for acts of misconduct committed by children.

Within the city limits, these courts have shared jurisdiction with the JP courts on Class C criminal misdemeanor cases and have exclusive jurisdiction on cases involving city ordinances. Municipal courts have limited civil jurisdiction over public matters relating to public safety (e.g., dangerous dog determinations). Confusion surrounding a municipal court's civil jurisdiction is complicated that if a municipal court is a "court of record," the Legislature has authorized municipalities to adopt ordinances that give municipal courts concurrent jurisdiction over substandard building cases with county and/or district courts. The matter of civil jurisdiction has been further confused by the advent of civil penalties for conduct that can be prosecuted as a Class C misdemeanor (e.g. certain parking violations, red light camera violations).




Emergency Responses

The Sanger Fire Department responded to 160 emergency incidents during the month of June. The top four busiest incident types:

- 83 Emergency Medical Incident
- 35 Service calls
- 20 Good Intent related incidents
- 14 Fire related incidents


The average response time for emergency related incidents was 7 minutes and 35 second for the entire 130 square mile district. The average time spent on a medical transport from initial alarm until units are back in service was 1 hour 5 minutes. The busiest day of the month for June was Tuesday with 20% of the call volume. Out of the 83 medical emergencies most occurred between the hours of 08:00/18:59 and 23:00/ 23:59.






Monthly Report – June 2018


As of January 1, 2018, the estimated population of Sanger is 8,400 (Source: NCTCOG, Regional Data Center). In 1970, the population was 1,603.

The purpose of the Financial Reporting function is to provide internal controls and financial information to City Council and City departments so that they may manage operations and meet financial reporting needs.







Public Works

McReynolds Paving Project: The asphalt paving testing has not been scheduled, to date. The hydro-mulching has been completed, and the fencing will begin as soon as possible. One additional driveway and two drop-inlet storm water boxes will be scheduled in July. Cleanup, etc. is scheduled to be completed before August 1st.

Dickerson Construction is working on cleaning up, seeding, cleaning manholes and repairing fences on **Phase III, the water and sewer line project to View Road.**

The **Nitrification Project:** Staff is taking additional chlorine samples at the request of TCEQ to research the effectiveness of the Break Point on eliminating the chloramines.

Lake Ridge, Phase II: CoServ is installing telephone poles and power lines on the north side of the addition. They plan to have the electrical services and street lights installed and completed in June.

Lake Ridge Phase III: FEMA has entered the advertising and public comment portion of the review process to approve the LOMR. This will be approximately four months to final approval.

Sanger Circle, Phase Six: Grading continues. It should be completed by mid-July.

Willowood Addition: RPM has started the installation of the storm water system and is continuing to grade the property.

Sable Creek: RKM, has completed the concrete paving. They are raising the sewer line cleanouts and setting the water meter boxes at grade.

R & L Carriers has completed the lime stabilization and has started placing the concrete paving. The water line to the north has been installed.

The **Fleet Department** continues to repair and maintain our vehicles and equipment with 6 scheduled preventative maintenance order repairs completed for the month and getting an average of 3 done a day. This month there was 0 emergency repair orders. The fleet department sublet 0 repairs costing \$0 total. There were 63 total work orders completed with 3 repair orders completed per day average. The total cost of these repairs came to \$4,325.18.

DID YOU KNOW...

Our fleet, for all city departments, consists of cars, trucks (pickups, dump trucks, fire trucks, bucket trucks, etc.), SUVs, motorized equipment (loaders, backhoes, skid steers, etc.), generators, and trailers.





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Water

Felix Construction continues to make progress on the improvements and expansion to the Wastewater Treatment Plant. During June they were able to:

- Apply the protective coating to the interior of Plant #1
- Install the safety handrails on new clarifiers #1 and #2.
- Installing electrical conduit and wiring on the UV disinfection chamber, sludge dewatering building, and new clarifiers #1 and #2.
- Installing instrumentation in the raw wastewater pump station.
- Installing process piping in the dewatering building.
- Pour two additional concrete pipe supports at the raw wastewater pump station.
- Pressure testing pipe between peak flow storage basin and raw wastewater pump station.
- Setup additional bypass pumps.
- Made modifications to the concrete structure around the step screen.

Bob Moore Construction was able to complete the installation of the new 8" water line and two fire hydrants along the service road North of View Road at the RL Carriers project.

Dickerson Construction is in the final stages on the water and sewer project between Lois Road and View Road. All of the manholes have passed the vacuum testing requirements. They still have to pull a 12" mandrel through the sewer line and perform some minor cleanup.

The Water Department was able to:

- Make repairs to 12 water service lines and 2 sewer taps.
Install 6 new water meters and change out 4 water meters.
- Visually read 611 water meters that were not read by the mobile collector.
- Complete 87 water and sewer service orders.
- Perform 34 meter disconnects for billing.

DID YOU KNOW...

The majority of community water systems (78%) are supplied by ground water, more people (68%) are supplied year-round by community water systems that use surface water.



Parks and Recreation Department

Operations:

The parks crew has continued the pesticide, fertilization, aerification, and irrigation schedule for the season. 375 acres were mowed in the month of June. The Parks Department completed 97 brush orders with 67% of the orders being completed within 10 days on avg. 9.4 days and used an estimated 49 labor hours.

Facilities:

Our facilities continue to be in regular use with 21 rentals for the month of June. Ball Fields and Pavilion Rentals hit an all-time rental high this month with 56 different reservations. Nine of those were pavilion rentals and the remaining 47 were field use. June was one of our busiest months on record for facility usage. Our facilities include our Community Center and Historic Presbyterian Church as well as park pavilions and ball fields.

Recreation:

On the Recreation side, June was the biggest month for this fairly new department. To start of the month of June two recreational adult sports leagues started. Wednesday nights Porter Park plays host to adult kickball which has three teams registered and Friday nights Railroad Baseball Park hosts adult softball which has four teams.
